

BASIC BOX LANTERN

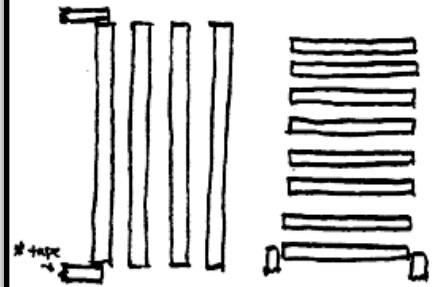
The first Lantern workshop I ever taught was based on faxed instructions from Welfare State International, a performance art company in England, in 1989.

The following techniques were developed through hundreds of workshops and ideas from many artists and participants.

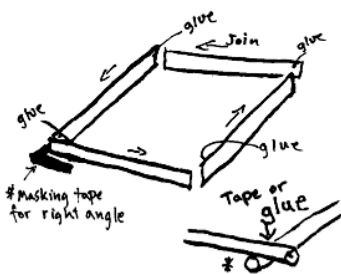
You Will Need

- * bamboo strips (I take apart old blinds - the flat strip kind) or other relatively straight stick
- * pruning shears or tin snips or heavy duty scissors
- * hot glue gun and glue sticks
- * 1/4" welded wire mesh (min 4") also called "hardware cloth"
- * needle nose pliers
- * soft brush (Chinese Calligraphy brush, best)
- * white glue
- * water & container for glue
- * 3 or 4 sheets "Art" quality tissue paper
- * tea candle in tin cup
- * fish line or flexible wire for hanging

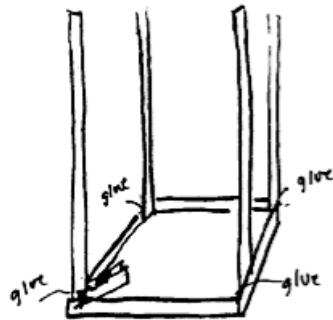


CUT 4 side pieces
8 equal pieces
for top & bottom
frames.

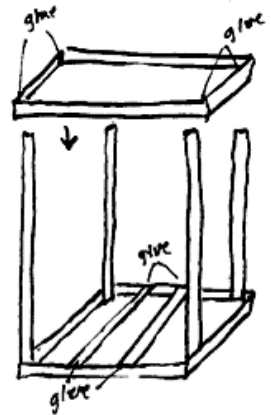
*Tip: use pieces of masking tape on your work surface to measure uniform pieces.



BUILD
Top and Bottom frame by putting hot glue on the flat side of one piece, and pushing edge of adjoining piece against it until glue sets.
* Cross pieces over if using sticks.

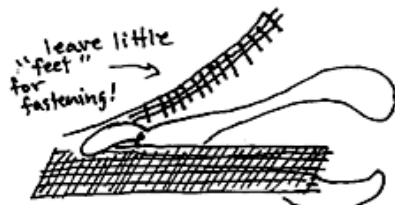


ATTACH the sides of the frame by putting a dab of hot glue on the bottom outside end and press it against the inside of frame.
You can use a clothespin to hold it in place until the glue sets.



ATTACH top frame to sides.

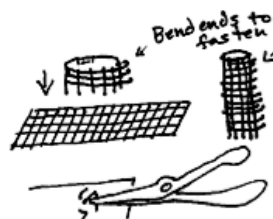
CUT 2 more strips to hold candle holder on bottom frame. Glue in place.



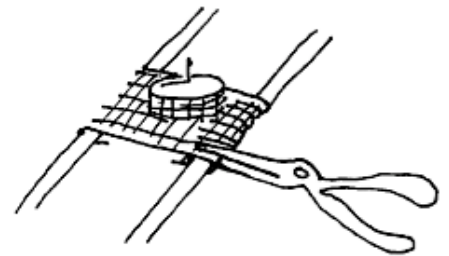
CUT narrow strip of WELDED WIRE MESH to wrap around candle, and a wider strip for the base.

USE Tin Snips, or old pruning shears that you will never use for pruning again.

Wear gloves!



Wrap strip around candle, with just enough room to easily slip candle in and out. Bend "little feet" to fasten. Push finished candle holder through mesh of BASE, bend "little feet" with pliers to fasten securely



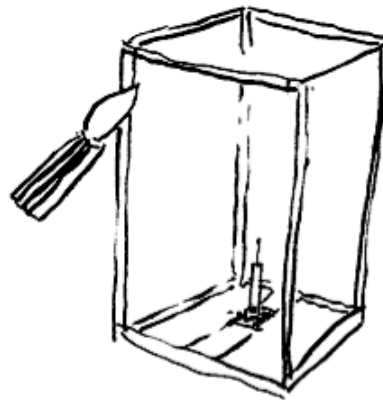
ATTACH candle holder to struts by bending ends around bamboo and press with pliers.

ADD a dab of hot glue to reinforce, if needed.

THE SAFETY of your LANTERN depends on the SECURITY of your CANDLE holder!



pour GLUE into container.
 ADD WATER ONE DROP at a TIME, and MIX.
 The consistency should resemble thick cream. Thin the glue just enough so it doesn't drag the paper during application.
 Never use glue in a COLD room. (if you're wearing mittens, it's too cold)



PAINT glue on frame, stretch paper across frame, one panel at a time.



PAINT Glue on papered edge of next frame panel. Overlap paper. You may also want to paper bottom, to cut down on wind.

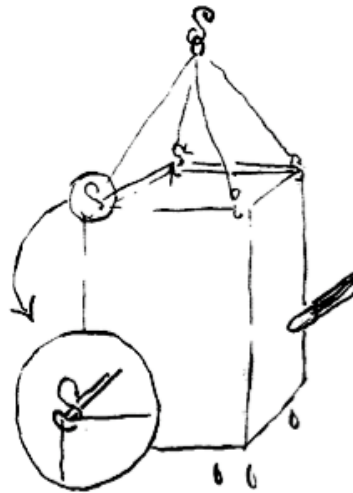
Once all the panels are covered with paper, paint the ENTIRE LANTERN with your glue mixture.

You may want to do one side at a time if there is no place to hang the lantern to drip dry.

Add any decorative bits at this time.

*The paper will sag with the weight of the GLUE.

DO NOT BE AFRAID! once the glue dries your lantern will be nice and taut.



MAKE little "S" hooks to attach fish line for hanging, or simply attach line at corners.

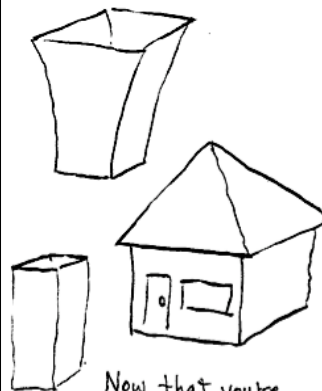
Your lantern is a vessel to contain light. The lighter the colour of tissue paper, the more light is radiated.

These lanterns can survive light rain fall ~ simply hang them in a dry place to recover.

Repairs are simple: paint glue over torn or punctured area, lay suitable piece of tissue across, and paint over with glue.

THINGS to add to a finished BLANK BOX lantern:

- Coloured tissue paper cut outs
 * Careful, some colours run.
- xerox images (colour or B&W)
- paints or inks
- cut-out silhouettes.
- writing



Now that you're an expert, try variations! Add a roof! (leave a heat vent) Have fun!
